## **House Concurrent Resolution No. 27**

## 97TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

INTRODUCED BY REPRESENTATIVES MAY (Sponsor), BUTLER, PETERS, LAFAVER, ROORDA, MORGAN, KIRKTON, NICHOLS, PIERSON, PACE, SMITH, MIMS, RUNIONS, CARPENTER, SWEARINGEN, ELLINGTON AND MCCANN BEATTY (Co-sponsors).

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	WHEREAS, the contributions of composer, musician, and publisher W.C. Handy helped
2 3	shape African-American folk music into what would be called "The Blues"; and
3 4	WHEREAS, W.C. Handy, the "Father of the Blues", was born in Alabama, the son of
4 5	former slaves. His first instrument was the cornet, and he advanced from lessons in a barbershop
5 6	quartet to studying classical music; and
7	quarter to studying classical music, and
8	WHEREAS, at age twenty, W.C. Handy organized a quartet to play at the 1893 Chicago
9	World's Fair, a gathering that attracted other musical luminaries of the time, notably ragtime
10	pianist Scott Joplin; and
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12	WHEREAS, when the fair was postponed for a year, W.C. Handy headed for St. Louis
13	where the quartet was soon forced to disband because the country was experiencing an economy
14	in panic; and
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16	WHEREAS, the St. Louis days would imprint themselves on W.C. Handy's mind and
17	music. Surrounded by misery and opulence alike, the young black man suffered from hunger and
18	lice, slept in a vacant lot, slumped in a poolroom chair, in a horse's stall, and on the cobblestones
19	of the levee of the Mississippi; and
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21	WHEREAS, as he related in his autobiography "Father of the Blues", his inner voice said
22	repeatedly, "Your father was right. Your place is in ministry" and his old schoolteacher's words
23	rang through his head, "What can music do but bring you to the gutter?"; and
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25	WHEREAS, W.C. Handy never gave in. He continued to eke out a living playing his
26	cornet and later noted that these down-and-out days would lead to the birth of the "St. Louis
27	Blues"; and
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29	WHEREAS, published 100 years ago in 1914, the "St. Louis Blues" had phenomenal
30	sales success, garnering worldwide acclaim and entering the repertoire of blues diva Bessie
31	Smith; and

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33 WHEREAS, in 1958, only months after W.C. Handy's death, his life story played on the 34 silver screen in theaters across the country in the film "St. Louis Blues", with starred singer Nat 35 King Cole as the legendary composer; and 36 37 WHEREAS, W.C. Handy's other songs include "The Memphis Blues", "Beale Street 38 Blues", "Aunt Hagar's Blues", and "Yellow Dog Blues"; and 39 40 WHEREAS, W.C. Handy's legacy continues to shine in the annals of music, with his 41 songs continually reinterpreted in idioms of blues, jazz, pop, and classical music; and 42 43 WHEREAS, today, the W.C. Handy Award is a prestigious prize reserved for blues 44 musicians; and 45 46 WHEREAS, the composer of more than 80 hymns, marches, and blues tunes, W.C. 47 Handy did more to carry the blues into the mainstream of music than any other man; and 48 49 WHEREAS, his contribution is a legacy that has exerted a profound and lasting 50 influence on music; and 51 52 WHEREAS, a larger than life bronze of W.C. Handy has been commissioned for 53 placement in front of the National Blues Museum in downtown St. Louis; and 54 55 WHEREAS, in the fall of 2014, the documentary "Mr. Handy's Blues", produced by 56 Emmy-winning producer Joanne Fish, will premiere in St. Louis to coincide with the unveiling of the Handy statue: 57 58 59 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the members of the House of Representatives of the Ninety-seventh General Assembly, Second Regular Session, the Senate 60 concurring therein, hereby recognize the week of September 7 to September 13, 2014, as "W.C. 61 Handy Week" in honor of the legendary "Father of the Blues" and writer of the song "St. Louis 62 Blues"; and 63 64 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the Missouri House of 65 Representatives be instructed to prepare a properly inscribed copy of this resolution for the W.C. 66
