## AN ACT

To amend chapter 160, RSMo, by adding thereto six new sections relating to adult high schools.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Chapter 160, RSMo, is amended by adding thereto six new sections, to be known as sections 160.2700, 160.2705, 160.2710, 160.2715, 160.2720, and 160.2725, to read 3 as follows:

- 160.2700. For purposes of this section, "adult high school" means a school that:
- 2 (1) Is for individuals who do not have a high school diploma and who are twenty-3 one years of age or older;
- 4 (2) Offers an industry certification program or programs and a high school 5 diploma in a manner that allows students to earn a diploma at the same time that they earn 6 an industry certification;
- 7 (3) Offers an on-site child care facility for children of enrolled students attending
   8 the school; and
  - (4) Is not eligible to receive funding under section 163.031.

160.2705. 1. The department of elementary and secondary education shall grant a license before January 1, 2018, to a Missouri-based nonprofit organization meeting the criteria under subsection 2 of this section to establish and operate three adult high schools, with one adult high school to be located in a city not within a county, one adult high school to be located in a county of the third classification without a township form of government and with more than forty-one thousand but fewer than forty-five thousand inhabitants or a county contiguous to that county, and one adult high school to be located in:

EXPLANATION — Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted from the law. Matter in **bold-face** type in the above bill is proposed language.

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8 (1) A county with more than sixty-five thousand but fewer than eighty-five 9 thousand inhabitants and with a county seat with more than seventeen thousand but fewer 10 than nineteen thousand inhabitants or a county contiguous to that county; or

(2) A county of the first classification with more than one hundred fifty thousand
 but fewer than two hundred thousand inhabitants or a county contiguous to that county.

13 2. The department of elementary and secondary education shall grant the license 14 described under subsection 1 of this section based on a bid process conducted in 15 accordance with the rules and regulations governing purchasing through the office of 16 administration. The successful bidder shall:

(1) Demonstrate the ability to establish, within twenty-one months of the receipt of
 the license, three adult high schools offering high school diplomas, an industry certification
 program or programs, and a drop-in day care facility for children of the students attending
 the high schools;

(2) Commit at least two million dollars in investment for the purpose of establishing
 the necessary infrastructure to operate three adult high schools;

(3) Demonstrate substantial and positive experience in providing services, including
 industry certifications and job placement services, to adults twenty-one years of age or
 older whose educational and training opportunities have been limited by educational
 disadvantages, disabilities, homelessness, criminal history, or similar circumstances;

(4) Establish a partnership with a state-supported postsecondary education
institution or more than one such partnership, if a partnership or partnerships are
necessary in order to meet the requirements for an adult high school;

30 (5) Establish a comprehensive plan that sets forth how the adult high schools will
31 help address the need for a sufficiently trained workforce in the surrounding region for
32 each adult high school;

(6) Establish partnerships and strategies for engaging the community and business
 leaders in carrying out the goals of each adult high school;

(7) Establish the ability to meet quality standards through certified teachers and
 programs that support each student in his or her goal to find a more rewarding job;

37 (8) Establish a plan for assisting students in overcoming barriers to educational
38 success including, but not limited to, educational disadvantages; homelessness; criminal
39 history; disability, including learning disability such as dyslexia; and similar
40 circumstances; and

41 (9) Establish a process for determining outcomes of the adult high school, including
42 outcomes related to a student's ability to find a more rewarding job through the attainment
43 of a high school diploma and job training and certification.

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3. (1) The department of elementary and secondary education shall work directly
with the successful bidder to assess the specific requirements for students to obtain high
school diplomas.

47 (2) Requirements for a high school diploma shall be based on an adult student's 48 prior high school achievement and the remaining credits and coursework that would be 49 necessary for the student to receive a high school diploma if he or she were in a traditional 50 high school setting. The adult student shall meet the requirements with the same level of 51 academic rigor as would otherwise be necessary to attain such credits, but the adult student 52 shall not be required to meet any additional requirements.

(3) The department of elementary and secondary education shall award high school diplomas to students who successfully complete the required credits through the adult high school. The department of elementary and secondary education shall confer the diploma as though the student earned the diploma at a traditional high school. The diploma shall have no differentiating marks, titles, or other symbols.

(4) Students at adult high schools may complete required coursework at their own
pace and as available through the adult high school. They shall not be required to satisfy
any specific number of class minutes.

61 (5) The department of elementary and secondary education shall not create 62 additional regulations or burdens on the adult high school or the students attending the 63 adult high schools beyond certifying necessary credits and ensuring that students have 64 sufficiently mastered the subject matter to make them eligible for credit.

160.2710. 1. Any person who is twenty-one years of age or older may enroll in an 2 adult high school if he or she has not earned a high school diploma.

2. An adult high school shall give a preference in admission to those students who
receive any local, state, or federal assistance in which a person or family is required not to
exceed a certain income level in order to qualify for the assistance.

160.2715. 1. An adult high school shall not receive state funding under section 2 163.031 and shall not receive any local funding that is intended to benefit traditional public 3 schools in the state.

2. An adult high school may receive funding from public or private sources, including from the nonprofit organization operating the adult high school. If an adult high school receives funding from a public source, it shall operate in a manner so as not to violate the provisions of article IX, section 8, or article I, section 7, of the Constitution of Missouri or the first amendment of the Constitution of the United States.

9 **3.** The nonprofit organization operating an adult high school shall ensure that 10 funding for the adult high school enables it to operate year-round. HB 680

4. The nonprofit organization operating an adult high school shall set the following
outcome expectations for the adult high school:

(1) Each year, at least seventy-five percent of the school's students will graduate
 or continue working toward a high school diploma and, if applicable, an industry
 certification;

16 (2) At least fifty percent of the school's graduates will attain an industry 17 certification or enroll in higher education or more advanced skills training within six 18 months of graduation;

(3) At least eighty-five percent of the school's graduates who do not enroll in higher
 education or more advanced skills training will be employed within six months of
 graduation; and

(4) The school's graduates who enter the workforce shall have, on average, a wage
rate at least twenty percent greater than the average Missouri wage rate for individuals
without high school diplomas.

160.2720. 1. The nonprofit organization who receives the license described under section 160.2705 shall submit to the department of elementary and secondary education an annual report concerning evaluations of the adult high schools, including the impact the adult high schools have had in meeting industry needs in the state.

5 2. The department of elementary and secondary education shall submit the report 6 described under subsection 1 of this section to the joint committee on education and the 7 offices of the governor, speaker of the house of representatives, and president pro tempore 8 of the senate before December first each year.

160.2725. The department of elementary and secondary education may promulgate 2 rules to implement the provisions of sections 160.2700 to 160.2720. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 536.010, that is created under the authority 3 delegated in this section shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all 4 5 of the provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable, and if any of the powers vested with the general assembly 6 7 pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking authority and 8 9 any rule proposed or adopted after August 28, 2017, shall be invalid and void.

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
