AN ACT

To repeal section 337.700, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof one new section relating to marital and family therapy.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

	Section A. Section 337.700, RSMo, is repealed and one new section enacted in lieu
2	thereof, to be known as section 337.700, to read as follows:

- 337.700. As used in sections 337.700 to 337.739, the following terms mean:
- (1) "Committee", the state committee for marital and family therapists;
- 3 (2) "Department", the Missouri department of insurance, financial institutions and
 4 professional registration;
 - (3) "Director", the director of the division of professional registration;
- 6 (4) "Division", the division of professional registration;
 - (5) "Fund", the marital and family therapists' fund created in section 337.712;
- 8 (6) "Licensed marital and family therapist", a person to whom a license has been issued 9 pursuant to the provisions of sections 337.700 to 337.739, whose license is in force and not
- 10 suspended or revoked;
- (7) "Marital and family therapy", the use of scientific and applied marriage and family
 theories, psychotherapy methods and procedures for the purpose of describing, diagnosing,
 evaluating and modifying marital, family, and individual behavior within [the context of marital
 and family systems, including the context of marital formation and dissolution] a system. A
 system can include, but is not limited to, the context of marital formation and dissolution,
 social, educational, vocational, and other systems. Marriage and family therapy is based on

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dysfunctional behavior, human sexuality and psychotherapeutic, marital and family therapy 18 theories and techniques and includes the use of marriage and family therapy theories and 19 20 techniques] in the diagnosis, evaluation, assessment and treatment of [intrapersonal or interpersonal dysfunctions within the context of marriage and family systems] mental health 21 22 and substance use disorders, partner relational problems, and other factors influencing 23 health status and contact with health services. Diagnosis of mental disorders includes, but 24 is not limited to, the current version of the Diagnostic Statistical Manual, which is the 25 current standard classification of mental disorders used by mental health professionals in 26 the United States and the International Classification of Diseases, which is the standard 27 diagnostic tool for epidemiology, health management, and clinical purposes. Marriage and 28 family therapy may also include clinical research into more effective methods for the treatment 29 and prevention of the above-named conditions; 30 (8) "Practice of marital and family therapy", the rendering of professional marital and

family therapy services, **psychotherapy**, **and counseling interventions** to individuals, family groups and marital pairs, singly or in groups, whether such services are offered directly to the general public or through organizations, either public or private, for a fee, monetary or otherwise,

34 to achieve more effective interpersonal and intrapersonal functioning;

(9) "Provisional licensed marital and family therapist", any person who is a graduate of an acceptable education institution described in subsection 1 of section 337.715 with at least a master's degree in marital and family therapy, or its equivalent as defined by state committee regulation, and meets all requirements of a licensed marital and family therapist other than the supervised clinical experience set forth in section 337.715, and who is supervised by a person who is qualified to be a supervisor, as defined by state committee regulation.

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
