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House Republicans Pass Balanced State Budget

Historic Investments in Education, Public Safety, and Transportation while Ensuring a Sustainable and Balanced Budget

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. – Today, Missouri House Republicans passed the Fiscal Year 2026 (FY26) state appropriations bills, a balanced state budget with historic investments in education, public safety, and transportation.

"Once again, House Republicans delivered a balanced state budget," **House Speaker Jon Patterson**, R-Lee's Summit, said. "I want to thank Budget Chair Dirk Deaton, Vice-Chair Bishop Davidson, and the entire budget committee for their hard work throughout the budget process. I believe Missourians can have confidence knowing we are funding the needs of Missourians, while remaining fiscally responsible."

"The House budget is a fiscally responsible spending plan that balances the budget. It leaves nearly \$2 billion on the bottom line to help sustain the budget into the future, while also making historic investments in critical areas," **Budget Chair Dirk Deaton**, R-Seneca, said. "Our focus is never just this fiscal year in isolation, but on lasting financial strength and stability in the Show-Me State. This is our mandate from Missouri citizens."

The Missouri FY26 state operating budget is approximately \$47.9 billion, including funds to support:

Education

- More than \$4 billion of state funding to support public education, including a \$200 million increase in foundation formula funding, the largest increase in more than 20 years.
- \$376 million in K-12 transportation funding, including \$15 million new dollars.
- \$50 million to expand the Empowerment Scholarship Program.
- \$33.4 million for the Teacher Baseline Salary Grant Program.
- \$27 million to continue higher education capital improvement projects.

• \$16.8 million core funding increase for state higher education institutions.

"We have fully funded the provisions of last year's education bill (SB 727), and we have invested a historic \$50 million into MO Scholars, ensuring a high-quality education for all Missouri families and students," Deaton also said. "Our budget also provides more money for higher education to continue training and growing our state workforce of tomorrow."

Public Safety

- 6.8% salary increase for troopers in the Highway Patrol.
- 6.8% salary increase for state park rangers.
- \$25 million for public safety, transportation, and other initiatives surrounding the 2026 FIFA World Cup in Kansas City.
- \$12.8 million for a new crime lab in Cape Girardeau.
- \$10 million to "Blue Shield," a new grant program for local police departments for training and
- equipment.
- \$5 million for a new grant program for volunteer fire departments.
- \$4 million to match local funding in support of a police training facility in O'Fallon.

Transportation

- \$70 million in new general revenue for highway projects across the state.
- \$20 million in additional funding for low-volume and lettered roads in rural areas.
- \$10 million for river ports infrastructure projects.
- \$1 million for a River des Peres flood risk and mitigation study.

Health & Family Services

- \$4 million increase for the Alternatives to Abortion program.
- \$3 million for a children's advocacy center in southwest Missouri.
- \$2 million in additional funding for Pregnancy Resource Center grants.
- \$1 million for nursing incentive grants to help grow Missouri's healthcare workforce.
- \$750,000 for Missouri foster children to support the goal of achieving placement with extended family members.
- \$250,000 for newborn safety incubators.
