	Whereas, for more than a decade, the United States and other nations have pursued
2	patient and honorable efforts to disarm the Iraqi regime without war; and
4	Whereas, on November 8, 2002, the United Nations Security Council approved
5 6 7	Security Council Resolution 1441 under Chapter VII of the United Nations Charter by a vote of 15-0, giving Iraq "a final opportunity to comply with its disarmament obligations"; and
8	Whereas, on November 21, 2002, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's North
9 10 11 12 13 14	Atlantic Council unanimously approved a declaration stating, "We deplore Iraq's failure to comply fully with its obligations which were imposed as a necessary step to restore international peace and security and we recall that the Security Council has decided in its resolution to afford Iraq a final opportunity to comply with its disarmament obligations under relevant resolutions of the Council."; and;
15	Whereas, Iraq's conventional, chemical, biological, and nuclear weapons and
16 17 18	ballistic missile programs and its demonstrated willingness to use weapons of mass destruction pose a grave threat to world peace; and
19	Whereas, Iraq is in material breach of United Nations Security Council resolutions,
20 21	including United Nations Resolution 1441; and
22	Whereas, the clear and present danger posed by Saddam Hussein's regime requires
23 24	a united response from the community of democracies; and

25	Whereas, the United States of America has the sovereign authority to use force in
26 27	assuring its own national security; and
28	Whereas, pursuant to United Nations Resolutions 678 and 687 the United States
29 30	and our allies are authorized to use force in ridding Iraq of weapons of mass destruction; and
31	Whereas, the President of the United States declared on March 17, 2003, that the
32 33 34	decades of deceit and cruelty have reached an end and that Saddam Hussein and his sons must leave Iraq within 48 hours; and
35	Whereas, Saddam Hussein and his sons remain in Iraq and have rejected the
36 37	President's demand; and
38	Whereas, the security of the world requires disarming Saddam Hussein without
39 40	delay:
41	Now, therefore, be it resolved that the members of the House of
42 43 44	Representatives of the Ninety-second General Assembly, First Regular Session, the Senate concurring therein, hereby patriotically support the work to advance liberty and peace in the Iraqi region; and
45	$f Be \ it \ further \ resolved$ that the power and appeal of human liberty is felt in
46 47 48	every life and every land, and the greatest power of freedom is to overcome hatred and violence, and turn the creative gifts of men and women to the pursuits of peace; and
49	Be it further resolved that free nations have a duty to defend their people
50 51	by uniting against the violent and oppressive; and
52	Be it further resolved that we support our national leaders in bringing to

justice Osama bin Laden and those responsible for terrorist attacks on United States soil and its 54 citizens; and
