	$\mathbf{W}\mathbf{hereas}$, the right to a private secret ballot when voting on external representation
2	is fundamentally inherent in our representative republic and shall not be infringed upon; and
4	Whereas, passing the Employee Free Choice Act (EFCA, H.R. 800/S. 1041) will
5 6 7 8	replace a federally supervised private ballot election with a system that facilitates coercion and intimidation, known as "card check", whereby employees publicly sign cards to vote for unionization; and
9	Whereas, 79 percent of the American people support a worker's right to a federally
10 11	supervised secret ballot election when deciding whether or not to join a union; and
12	Whereas, the tri-partisan agreement to oppose the EFCA is overwhelming, as 77
13 14 15	percent of Republicans, 82 percent of Democrats, and 79 percent of Independents believe in protecting private ballots; and
16	Whereas, in July 2002, before a U.S. House subcommittee, a union employee
17 18 19	testified that those who would not vote for a union in a public "card check" program were threatened with termination, deportation, and loss of 401(k) and health benefits; and
20	Whereas, even the chairman of the U.S. House Education and Labor Committee

Miller (D-California), and staunch supporter of the American "card check" bill, sent a letter to Mexican government officials which stated, " we feel that the private ballot is absolutely necessary in order to ensure workers are not intimidated into voting for a union they may otherwise not choose."; and

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Whereas, the EFCA's mandatory binding arbitration provisions deny workers the 27 right to participate in the collective bargaining process between employees and the union: 28 Now, therefore, be it resolved that we, the members of the Missouri 29 House of Representatives, Ninety-fifth General Assembly, find that so-called "card check" 30 legislation such as the "Employee Free Choice Act" is detrimental to the rights of workers and 31 32 an offense against democratic principles, and urges all members of the congressional delegation 33 to support worker freedom by opposing the EFCA and any of its components in 2009 and in 34 future years; and 35 Be it further resolved that the Chief Clerk of the Missouri House of 36 37 Representatives be instructed to prepare a properly inscribed copy of this resolution for each 38 member of Missouri's congressional delegation.

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
