at any time.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Corrections (DOC)** state the existing penalty provision component of this bill resulting in potential fiscal impact for DOC, is for up to a class A felony. Currently, the DOC cannot predict the number of new commitments which may result from the lifting of the statute of limitation for the offense(s) outlined in this proposal. An increase in commitments depends on the utilization by prosecutors and the actual sentences imposed by the court.

If additional persons are sentenced to the custody of the DOC due to the provisions of this legislation, the DOC will incur a corresponding increase in direct offender cost either through incarceration (FY13 average of \$18.014 per offender, per day, or an annual cost of \$6,575 per inmate) or through supervision provided by the Board of Probation and Parole (FY13 average of \$5.07 per offender, per day or an annual cost of \$1,851 per offender).

In summary, supervision by the DOC through probation or incarceration would result in additional unknown costs to the department. Sixteen (16) persons would have to be incarcerated per each fiscal year to exceed \$100,000 annually. Due to the narrow scope of this crime enhancement, it is assumed the impact would be less than \$100,000 per year for the DOC.

For the purpose of this proposed legislation, officials at the **Office of State Public Defender** (**SPD**) cannot assume that existing staff will provide effective representation for any new cases arising where indigent persons face charges of child abuse and sexual offenses committed against a child after the current statute of limitations has expired (10 years and 30 years respectively).

While the number of new cases (or cases with increased penalties) may be too few or uncertain to request additional funding for this specific bill, the SPD will continue to request sufficient appropriations to provide effective representation in all cases where the right to counsel attaches.

Oversight assumes the SPD can absorb the additional caseload that may result from this proposal.

Officials from the **Office of the State Courts Administrator (CTS)** state the proposal is not anticipated to cause a fiscal impact in excess of \$100,000.

Oversight assumes CTS could implement the proposal with existing resources.

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

This proposal changes the statute of limitations for certain offenses. In its main provisions, the bill specifies:

(1) Prosecutions for unlawful sexual offenses involving a person 18 years of age or under may be commenced at any time. Currently, such prosecutions must be commenced within 30 years after victim reaches the age of 18; and

FISCAL DESCRIPTION (continued)

(2) Prosecutions for child abuse my be commenced at any time.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
