FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Higher Education (DHE)** state the proposal requires the creation of the Coordinating Board for Mental Health Issues in Higher Education (CBMHI) within the DHE. DHE would promulgate rules and set standards and regulations for student counseling facilities at public institutions of higher education. Furthermore, the proposal requires the new coordinating board to develop a process for measuring/assessing institutions' ability to meet these requirements and objectively evaluate the programs for effectiveness.

DHE assumes the department will need one full time position (Research Associate II, \$37,176 annually) to coordinate the CBMHI and conduct research and develop the rules, train institutions on the standards and regulations and then to evaluate and report on the institutions ability to meet the standards, etc.

Officials from the **University of Central Missouri (UCM)** state the cost of participation on the coordinating board for mental health issues in higher education and that of modifying campus services to comply with possible rules is estimated at:

- \$417,080 per year; and
- \$51,200 one-time or initial costs

UCM states the estimate includes:

- 1. The time and expense of participation by one administrator or the counseling center director on the CBMHI:
 - One in-person and monthly phone meetings = \$880 per year
 - Research and creation of rules and procedures = \$1,600
- 2. The time and expense for initial and yearly evaluation of services to comply with rules and prepare reports is estimated at \$1,600 per year.
- 3. The cost of increasing capacity for counseling services and programs is estimated at \$414,600 per year and \$48,000 in initial cost. The estimate assumes an addition of four 9-month clinical, one administrative and one support staff, an increase in operating budget and the cost of conducting searches.

Officials from **Missouri State University (MSU)** state this proposal will have a potential negative fiscal impact of an undetermined amount to MSU.

ASSUMPTION (continued)

Oversight assumes there could be some costs associated with meeting the standards developed by the coordinating board. Oversight notes the proposal provides that each public four-year institution of higher education, in the 2020-2021 school year, shall report on compliance with the new standards and what plan the institution has to meet the standards. Therefore, Oversight will reflect the potential unknown costs to public colleges and universities beginning in FY 2021.

Officials from the **Department of Mental Health**, **University of Missouri System** and the **State Technical College of Missouri** each assume the proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

Officials from the **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)** state many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The SOS is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. The fiscal impact for this fiscal note to the SOS for Administrative Rules is less than \$2,500. The SOS recognizes that this is a small amount and does not expect that additional funding would be required to meet these costs. However, the SOS also recognizes that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what the office can sustain with the core budget. Therefore, the SOS reserves the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

Oversight assumes the SOS could absorb the costs of printing and distributing regulations related to this proposal. If multiple bills pass which require the printing and distribution of regulations at substantial costs, the SOS could request funding through the appropriation process.

Officials from the **Joint Committee on Administrative Rules** assume this proposal is not anticipated to cause a fiscal impact beyond its current appropriation.

Officials from the following **colleges and universities**: Crowder, East Central, Harris-Stowe, Jefferson College, Kansas City Metropolitan Community College, Lincoln University, Moberly Area Community College, Missouri Southern State College, Missouri Western State University, Northwest Missouri State University, Southeast Missouri State University, State Fair Community College, St. Charles Community College, St. Louis Community College, Three Rivers Community College and Truman State University did not respond to **Oversight's** request for a statement of fiscal impact.

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

Prior to January 1, 2019, the Department of Higher Education must promulgate rules establishing the Coordinating Board for Mental Health Issues in Higher Education (CBMHI). The CBMHI will consist of designated administrators and counseling directors from each public four-year institution of higher education in the state.

Prior to January 1, 2020, CBMHI shall set forth reasonable standards and regulations for student counseling facilities at public four-year institutions of higher education relating to mental health problems within the academic community. The CBMHI must develop a process for evaluating an institution's effectiveness in addressing student mental health needs.

Beginning in the 2020-21 school year, each public four-year institution must publish a report measuring compliance with the standards set forth by the CBMHI and a measure of the institution's effectiveness in meeting student mental health needs.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
