#### FISCAL ANALYSIS

#### **ASSUMPTION**

§§338.010 and 338.720 - Pharmacists to dispense self-administered oral contraceptives

Officials from the **Department of Insurance**, **Financial Institutions and Professional Registration (DIFP)** state this bill is anticipated to have no fiscal impact to the DIFP. However, should the extent of the work be more than anticipated, the DIFP would request additional appropriation and/or FTE through the budget process.

**Oversight** does not have any information to the contrary. Oversight assumes the DIFP has sufficient staff and resources to perform the additional duties mandated under this proposal and will reflect no fiscal impact to the DIFP for fiscal note purposes.

Oversight notes that the **Department of Health and Senior Services** and the **Department of Social Services** have stated the proposal would not have a direct fiscal impact on their organizations. Oversight does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact in the fiscal note for these organizations.

Officials from the **Joint Committee on Administrative Rules (JCAR)** state the legislation is not anticipated to cause a fiscal impact to JCAR beyond its current appropriation.

**Oversight** assumes JCAR will be able to administer any rules resulting from this proposal with existing resources.

In response to the previous version of this proposal, officials from the **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)** stated many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The SOS is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. The fiscal impact for this fiscal note to the SOS for Administrative Rules is less than \$5,000. The SOS recognizes that this is a small amount and does not expect that additional funding would be required to meet

these costs. However, the SOS also recognizes that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what the office can sustain with the core budget. Therefore, the SOS reserves the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

**Oversight** assumes the SOS could absorb the costs of printing and distributing regulations related to this proposal. If multiple bills pass which require the printing and distribution of regulations at substantial costs, the SOS could require additional resources.

#### FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

§338.720 - This proposal would directly impact small business pharmacies. Pharmacists in small businesses must complete a training program related to prescribing self-administered oral hormonal contraceptives, provide a self-screening risk assessment tool for use by the patient prior to the pharmacist's prescribing the contraceptive available, be able to refer the patient to the patient's primary care practitioner or women's health care practitioner before dispensing self-administered oral contraceptives, and provide the patient with a written record of the contraceptive prescribed.

#### FISCAL DESCRIPTION

The proposed legislation appears to have no direct fiscal impact.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
